### Malrotation

\* Ladd's Procedure: The small intestine is positioned correctly and attached to the abdominal wall to prevent twisting and obstruction.

#### Intussusception

\* **Pneumatic Reduction:** Air is gently pumped into the rectum to deinvaginate the intussuscepted bowel. \* **Surgical Reduction:** If pneumatic reduction fails, surgery is required to manually de-invaginate the bowel and correct the underlying cause.

### **Post-Operative Care**

After surgery, your child will require specialized care to ensure proper recovery. This may include:

\* Pain management \* Bowel management \* Dietary modifications \*
Antibiotics \* Stoma care (if applicable)


If your child exhibits any of the following symptoms, seek immediate medical attention:

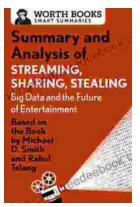


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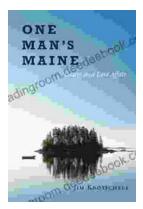
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
